Meet our speaker

Although Connie Lapallo has a degree in Finance from Virginia Tech and an MBA from the University of Georgia, her real passion is history, specifically the history of her family in Jamestown.

As a little girl her grandmother lived with her family and would tell stories about growing up. When Connie was in the 9th grade, her class assignment was to develop a family tree. All these years later, she is still researching it.

After tracing her lineage back to Cecily Bailey, a young child who came to Jamestown in 1611, she realized that history has largely overlooked this courageous group of one hundred women and children. There was little information on them, no books dedicated to telling their authentic story, and virtually no information on who they might have been in England before becoming Jamestown Adventurers.

The first book, *Dark Enough to See the Stars in a Jamestown Sky*, published in 2006, tells a simple, true story of suffering and survival of Cecily and her family. The second, *When the Moon Has No More Silver*, follows the story of the women and children through the years 1610 to 1620. The end of the trilogy, follows Cecily into marriage and a family of her own in the still trying times of the first colony of our country.

Connie and her husband Chris live in Mechanicsville, Virginia where she has homeschooled her

children since 1997. Although three have now graduated from her school and are in college, Connie still homeschools youngest son, Adam.

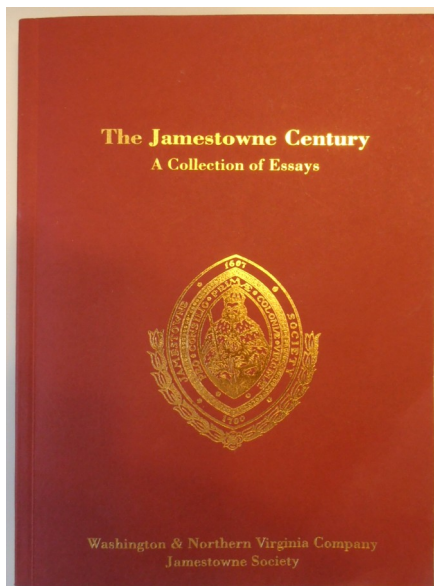
